

SO WHAT IS "RIPPING YARNS" ANYWAY?

Ripping Yarns was written by Michael Palin and Terry Jones of Monty Python fame and commissioned by the BBC. Following an initial pilot episode in January 1976 ("Tomkinson's Schooldays"), it ran for two series — five episodes in September and October 1977 and three episodes in October 1979. Each episode has a different setting and characters, each looking at a different aspect of British culture and parodying pre-World War II literature aimed at schoolboys.


The pilot episode featured Palin and Jones playing multiple roles but once the series was picked up, Jones did not appear in any further episodes. Instead, the leads in all the subsequent episodes were played by Palin.

Each episode featured several guest character actors including Ian Ogilvy, Kenneth Colley, Liz Smith, Roy Kinnear, Frank Middlemass, Iain Cuthbertson, John Le Mesurier, Jan Francis, Denholm Elliott, Gwen Taylor, Harold Innocent, Richard Vernon, Gwen Watford, Barbara New,

Gerald Sim, Gilly Flower, Joan Sanderson, Roger Sloman and David Griffin. John Cleese even made a cameo appearance in the episode "Golden Gordon".

The series was nominated for a BAFTA award in 1978 for 'Best Film Cameraman' (unusual for the time and type of production much of it was photographed on film rather than videotape) and won in 1980 for 'Best Light Entertainment Programme/Series'.

In 2009, MKTOC staged three episodes of Ripping Yarns - "The Testing of Eric Olthwaite", "Murder at Moorstones Manor" and "Across the Andes by Frog". It's taken us a while to get on to three more episodes, and



if history repeats itself you can look forward to our staging of "Roger of the Raj", "Whinfrey's Last Case" and "The Curse of the Claw" in 2033!
